Interesting news received from Pat Long, Johnstown, N.Y. Johnstown was honored May 9th by a visit of Sir John and Lady Johnson of London, England. Sir John is the sixth Baronet of York and a descendant of Sir William Johnson the founder of Johnstown.

Longacres Morgan Farm also had the pleasure of having the Johnsons visit. I quote Pat: "They had come by the way of Canada and had heard about the Morgan horse every where they went. (Our friends north of the border, must be doing a good job promoting the Morgan.) Lady Johnson had only seen a half-Morgan and wanted to see Pure-bred stock. Unfortunately there was a downpour that day and the

photographers were unable to take pictures as planned, but Lord Linsley put on a demonstration in the rain anyway. Lady Johnson was impressed with the Morgan looks and especially the temperament.

The Johnsons have a stable of 16 or 18 (she wasn't sure) Hunters, which they have shown professionally. They have a 4 year old who will make his debut at the Toronto Fair — "he will fly in with his trainer."

Lady Johnson was a very charming person, and interesting to talk to. Here are some of her comments about showing horses in England.

"First, they cannot show a horse under saddle until it is 4 years old" Up until then they show 'on the line', in her words. (They don't do harness work).

"The judge must ride every horse in the class. She says he sometimes rides as many as 40 horses in a class! (No comment from either Pat or your editor on that.)

"In England the judge must run his hand down the legs of the animals being shown. Lady Johnson feels their judges are 'very brave.'" That's an understatement!

The Johnson's left Longacres with some Morgan literature and the Longs address so they can correspond. Pat wants to send the Morgan Magazine to them, as she feels that there could be quite a market for Morgans in England.

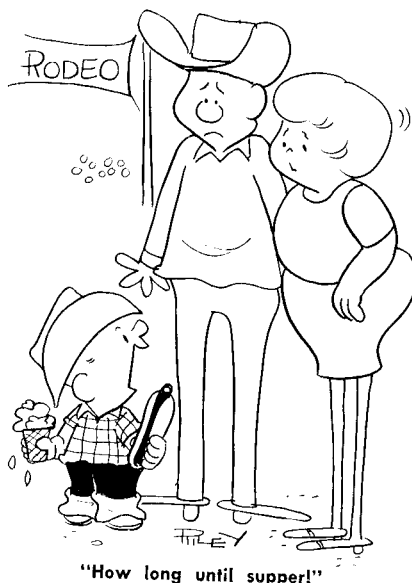

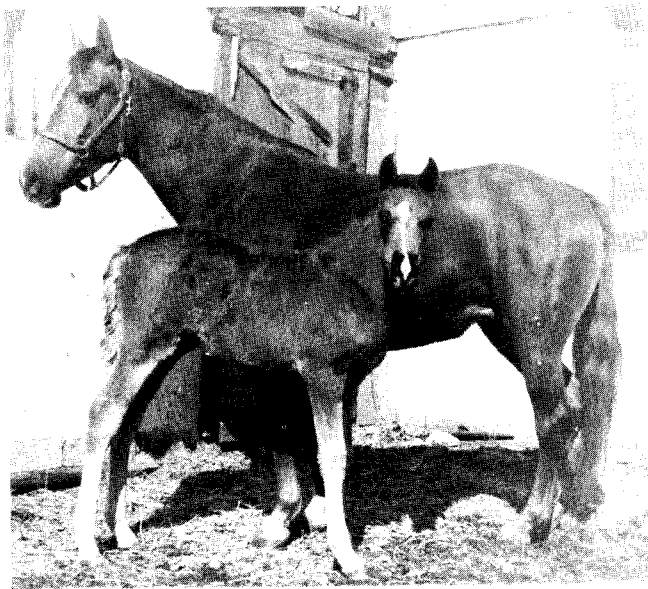
