The following stallions have been Grand Champions, Reserve Grand Champions or winners of coveted Sire & Get class at a National Morgan Show since it was revived after World War II. It is not here alone that they have left their mark. Through them the Morgan breed has developed and grown to be one of the most popular breeds in America. Some of these stallions have produced champions that are shown across the country. The younger ones show promise of doing the same. All of them have been an asset to the Morgan breed, for crossed with the Morgan mares of today they are producing a Morgan of quality and uniformity many of which you see here at our National Morgan Horse Show.

WASEEKA'S HERE TIZ 14011

Foaled: 1962

Owned by Mrs. D. D. Power
Waseeka Farm, Ashland, Mass.

Sire: Waseeka's Nocturne Dam: Waseeka's This Is It
This young stallion was brought out at the Show in 1964 as a two-year-old and was first in his class, Jr. Champion Stallion and Reserve Champion Stallion.
Shown the first time this year at the Farmington, Conn. show, he won the Junior In-Hand class.

This young stallion began his show career with the National Morgan Show in 1963 and was Reserve Jr. Champion that year. He went on to receive this same award at Eastern States and later was Jr. Champion at the New York Morgan Show.
In 1964 he received the Northshore Horsemen's Association Jr. Champion Model and Jr. Champion Harness awards in the Morgan division.
Teamed with his stablemate, Wind-Crest Showgirl, he is shown in harness by their trainer, Dr. Bob Orcutt.



BAY STATE FLINTLOCK 12111

Sire: Upwey Ben Don Dam: Damsel
Bay State Flintlock is the senior stallion at the University of Massachusetts. He is sired by the famous Morgan Upwey Ben Don, and out of Damsel, a Bennington daughter from the United States Morgan Horse Farm.

"Flintlock" won the three-year-old class at the 1961 National and went on to be named Reserve Grand Champion of the show.
Bay State Flintlock is exhibiting his worth as the sire of a number of attractive, strong, and intelligent young horses that are now entering the University herd for use in the student riding program.

Flintlock has been on lease to the University of New Hampshire for the past two years but he is again home at the University of Massachusetts in Amherst.

By Upwey Ben Don out of Abbington of Shady Lawn, Marauder was Grand Champion at the National Morgan Horse Show in 1961 and Reserve Grand Champion Stallion

in 1963. His dam, Abbington of Shady Lawn, was Grand Champion Mare at the National in 1949, and his sire, Upwey Ben Don, was Grand Champion Stallion in 1951 and five times winner of the Sire & Get class. Green Meads Marauder has won many championships and blues, and was chosen as a typical Morgan to represent Justin Morgan in the pageant, "Memorial to Justin Morgan," held here last year.



WIND-CREST DAPPER DAN 11620

Foaled: 1956

Sire: Upwey Ben Don Dam: Piankeshaw Juzana
 Owned by Mr. & Mrs. Ralph Linton
 Star Crest Morgan Farm, North Carver, Mass.
 Purchased from Wind-Crest at the age of six months and having been shown at the National Morgan shows since he was two, he has always returned home with a ribbon. He was Junior Champion Stallion in 1959 and Reserve Grand Champion Stallion in 1961. With only two months' training from an open horse to a pleasure horse he placed third in the Pleasure Stake in 1964.



WIND-CREST DONALD 11614

Foaled: May 9, 1956

 Owned and Shown by Mrs. A. S. Kelly, Chester, Vt.
 He was Reserve Junior Champion Stallion at this show in 1958 and has not been shown since.
 Now owned by Mr. & Mrs. Bob Hudson, Horse Shoe Farm, Chester, Vt.
 Donald represented Justin Morgan in stages of his life in the pageant, "Memorial to Justin Morgan," staged here last year.
 He is full brother to the Grand Champions, Wind-Crest's Donna Lee and Top Hand.



GLADGAY'S PRIDE

Gladgay's Pride was born in May of 1956. He is owned and bred by Mr. and Mrs. Mark H. Hanna of Framingham, Massachusetts.

His sire is the famous double Grand Champion, Orland Leader, and his dam is the equally famous broodmare, Glady, who is the mother to five National Grand Champions.

His horse show career started at the National Morgan Horse Show in 1956 where he placed second in the Stallion Foal class. As a two-year-old, he was first in Harness at the National Morgan Show. The crowning achievement, however, as a colt, was when he won the Two-Year-Old Morgan class at the Eastern States Horse Show; then went on to be Morgan Champion, Two-Year-Old Champion, and finally Grand Champion over all breeds. This marked the first time in the history of the Eastern States Horse Show that a Morgan colt was Grand Champion over all breeds. The next weekend, Pride won the Two-Year-Old Open Colt class and was Champion Colt of the show at Deerfield, N. H.

The following years brought many more tri-colors to Pride, beginning with a Reserve in the Junior Saddle Stake at the 1960 National Morgan Horse Show. The 1961 season brought two more Grand Championships at the Green Mountain Stock Farm All Morgan Show and at the All Morgan Show in Syracuse. He also had a Reserve in the Saddle Stake at Green Mountain. In 1963 he again was Grand Champion Stallion at Syracuse and the same year was Massachusetts High Point Morgan. At the Eastern States Horse Show in 1963 he won the Open Amateur and Amateur Morgan Horse Championship.

In 1964 he was forever stamped in Morgan History by being chosen Senior Champion and Grand Champion Stallion at the National Morgan Horse Show. He was also Reserve Grand Champion Saddle Horse at the same show. He then repeated at the Eastern States Horse Show by winning the In-Hand Morgan, the Open Amateur, and Amateur Morgan Championship.



UVM CANTOR 11499

Foaled: 1955

Sire: Tutor 10198 Dam: Sugar 07543
 Bred and Owned by The University of Vermont
 Cantor has had a long and illustrious show career. In 1957 he was Open Colt Champion of the State of Vermont. He consistently took ribbons at the National in two and three-year-old classes and in 1959 was Reserve Grand Champion Stallion of the National Morgan Show. He was one of Tutor's winning get the same year.
 In 1964 Cantor placed 3rd in the \$500 Harness Special at the National. At the 175th Anniversary Show at Windsor, Vermont, in 1964 Cantor won Stallions Under Saddle, Stallions in Harness, and the Harness Championship.
 His disposition is unexcelled and his progeny are in great demand. He likes to acknowledge public recognition by bowing.



WASEEKA'S NOCTURNE 11181

Foaled: May 1, 1954

Bred by F. O. Davis, Wind-Crest, Windsor, Vt.

Owned by Mrs. D. D. Power

Waseeka Farm, Ashland, Mass.

This stallion began his career by being Reserve Jr. Champion Stallion at this show when only a Foal. Thus he continued by winning, at this show alone, 16 blues, including Champion Saddle Stake in '59, '60, '61, '62 and '63. In 1964 he won the \$500 Special Saddle Class as well as the Sire & Get. He climaxed his ten years of showing by retiring the Wind-Crest Dona Lee Challenge Trophy at the Pennsylvania National last fall.

This American Horse Show Association winner of '60 and '61 has traveled many miles and made many friends. He will be missed in the performance classes as he has been retired from these but his many get, such as Waseeka Theme Song and Waseeka's Here Tiz, are carrying on for him.



GAY DANCER

Gay Dancer, son of Havolyn Dancer and Deerfield Leading Lady, was born in February of 1953 at the home of Dr. S. Robert Orcutt of Rowley, Mass. He had been promised at birth to Mrs. Joyce Gadd in return for her boarding of Dancer's dam during Dr. Orcutt's two-year rendezvous with Uncle Sam. Six months later, her increasing family forced Mrs. Gadd to sell her new acquisition. Dancer's new and final owner was Dr. C. P. Nelson, a then prospective veterinary student from Boxford, Mass.

Dancer spent his first nine years in training for the show circuit in the hands of both his owner and Dr. Orcutt. His National debut, a victory in a class of twenty two-year-old harness horses, was a harbinger of still better years ahead. He won his first saddle class at the National the next year. As a four-year-old he not only won the Junior Saddle Stake but was also placed Reserve Champion in the Junior Harness Stake. As an open horse he went on to become the only Morgan ever to complement tri-colors in both Junior Stakes with tri-colors in both the open Saddle and Harness Championships.

Dancer's show ring victories have not been limited to performance classes alone. Although physical maturity did not come to him until his seventh year, it proved to be well worth the waiting when it arrived. He developed into a stallion whose musculature and refinement were so evenly balanced that his every move emanated power and grace. He was judged Reserve Champion Stallion in his first show In-Hand at the National; and in 1962, he moved up another notch to become Grand Champion Stallion of that year.

Although Dancer is a relatively young stallion, his progeny have already established enviable show records. The names of Gay Cavalier, Bold Venture, Tiger Allen, Fashion Plate, and others have headed Championship classes at the National and regional Morgan shows. Now that he is used more extensively at stud his successful show get should be more numerous and widespread. The existence of outstanding stallions like Gay Dancer is the best promotion the Morgan breed can have.

Foaled: June 1, 1953

1962 New Hampshire Morgan Harness State Champion

Juneson returned to the National in 1961 and 1962 and placed high in the ribbons in the Combination Class and Stallions Over 15 Hands Performance Classes both years. His Championship wins at shows in and around New Hampshire and Vermont throughout his 12 years are too numerous to mention.

He is standing in Lebanon, New Hampshire, where he has spent the greatest part of his life with his owner, Bronc Farnsworth.



SEALECT OF WINDCREST 10427

Sire: Pecos 8968

Dam: Janee 05202

Sealect was foaled in July, 1950. He was bred by Philip Hess of Akron, New York, and originally registered under the name Ledgewood Sealect. He was sold to Mr. F. O. Davis of Windcrest Farm, Windsor, Vermont, in 1954, who renamed him Sealect of Windcrest. He was shown by Mr. Davis and used in his breeding program at the farm. In 1955 Sealect was pinned Reserve Grand Champion Stallion at the National Morgan Horse Show. At the 1956 National he was sold to Mr. Gordon Voorhis of Red Hook, New York, where he was successfully shown for seven consecutive seasons by Trainer, Fred Herrick. Among his National wins have been: Reserve Grand Champion Harness Horse in 1961 and winner of the Sire and Get class in 1962. Also in 1962, a daughter, Petalbrook Amylect, was Reserve Junior Champion Mare and a son, Windcrest Troubadour, was Reserve Junior Champion Stallion. In 1964 his daughter, Windcrest Showgirl, climaxed her many other outstanding wins to be named Grand Champion Mare at the National, the Mid-Atlantic Morgan Show and the New York Morgan Show. Sealect is now retired from show ring performance and standing at stud.



PARADE 10188

Foaled: May 17, 1948

Parade was National Grand Champion in 1955, National Reserve Champion Saddle Horse in 1957 and National Reserve Champion Harness Horse in 1960 at 12 years of age. He has also won many blue ribbons in Combination classes and Harness pairs.

Many national and regional champions have been sired by Parade as well as numerous winners in pleasure divisions.

The highlight of his career was the tour he and his son, Broadwall Drum Major, made with the famous White Stallions of Vienna in 1964. He became known to many people throughout the country on this memorable tour with the Lipizzans of the Spanish Riding School. This was accomplished at 16 years of age.

Now, a year later, he will appear in some of the classes at the show, still going as strong as ever.



ORCLAND VIGILDON 10095

Orcland Vigildon 10095, pictured here in 1964, is sired by Ulendon and out of Vigilda Burkland. The quality of his pedigree is self explanatory. He was born in 1947. At six months old he was purchased by his present owners, the Townshend Morgan-Holstein Farm, from Dr. W. L. Orcutt. From then until he was two and a half he ran out in pasture winter and summer, with Holstein heifers for his companions. At first the neighbors began to remark about this spunky little colt and then, Morgan enthusiasts started to notice his airy way of going and his terrific presence. It was the winter of his third year that the local sheriff constantly complained about the traffic jams in front of Vigildon's pasture on busy route 30. Everyone stopped to watch his lofty manner and fluid motion. In about the following year Dr. S. Robert Orcutt returned from the Service and wanted Vigildon to show. From that time on Vigildon went on to be a many times Champion, including such wins as New England Champion Morgan 1953, Eastern States Exposition Champion 1953 and 1954, Pennsylvania National Champion 1955, and Reserve Champion Saddle and Harness horse at the National Morgan Show 1954 and 1956, respectively. In 1961 and 1963 he was winner of the Sire and Get class at the National Morgan Show.

Orcland Vigildon's offspring are Champions in their own right both in New England and in the Mid-West. Some of these winners include Vigilmay, Vigilmarch, Long Hill Vigiltor, Townshend Vigileve, Townshend Vigalect, Townshend Vigalvin, Townshend Vigilass, Green Mt. T-Bird, and UVM Cathy.



BART FARMS ORCLAND LEADER 9038

Leader is twenty-one years old and was shown for many years by owner Steve Tompkins. He was three times Grand Champion Saddle Horse, first in 1949, then in 1952 and 1953. He was Grand Champion Model Stallion in 1952. He won the Sire & Get class in 1958 and 1960. He has sired many of the recent champions as the following wins by his get at the 1964 N.M.H.S.

Deerfield Phyllistine, Junior Champion Mare; Gladgay's Pride, Grand Champion Stallion; Bay State Gallant, Grand Champion Saddle Horse; Bay State Gallant, Harness Stake Horse; Bar-T Leading Man, Gelding Saddle Stake; Hillcrest Leader, \$500 Harness Special.

UPWEY BEN DON 8843

Foaled: July 17, 1943

Sire: Upwey King Benn Dam: Quietude
Bred by Owen Moon, Upwey Farm, South Woodstock, Vt.
Owned by Mrs. F. O. Davis and the Late "Ted" Davis
Wind-Crest, Windsor, Vt.

The foundation sire of Wind-Crest Morgans. His National Morgan show record began in 1948 when he was named Grand Champion Saddle Horse. He went on to be three times winner of Stallions Under Saddle and five times winner of the Sire & Get class, 1953-57. Trained and shown by the late "Ted" Davis, he was successful in roadster classes after being retired from saddle competition. Since then he has seen his get dominate the championship classes especially at the 1960 show, when they captured all championships with one exception, that being out of a full sister. Wind-Crest Donfield, W-C Donna Lee, W-C Donald, Green Meads Marauder, Kingston and W-C Delight are but a few of his well known get who are influencing the breed of today.
